

## Parenthetical wording

*Skillful writers set apart and de-emphasized non-restrictive wording using commas. Parenthetical wording is also set apart by commas, but is not de-emphasized. Instead, the visual separation suggests an aside, explanation, or afterthought. Comma pairs, or commas that sandwich wording, then, can de-emphasize or separate and in some cases even emphasize. Writers must become comfortable with the fluidity of meaning offered by commas used in this way.*

### Examples of parenthetical wording

1. The biggest problem, he had thought, was going to be getting the piano onto the motorbike.
2. Who would notice, at first glance, that the instrument was even gone?
3. The theft, they supposed, happened during the three-hour lunch break.
